1 Kings 17:7-24			
Elijah and the Widow at Zarephath			
<ul> <li><sup>7</sup> Some time later the brook dried up because there had been no rain in the land. <sup>8</sup> Then the word of the LORD came to him: <sup>9</sup> "Go at once to Zarephath in the region of Sidon and stay there. I have directed a widow there to supply you with food." <sup>10</sup> So he went to Zarephath. When he came to the town gate, a widow was there gathering sticks. He called to her and asked, "Would you bring me a little water in a jar so I may have a drink?" <sup>11</sup> As she was going to get it, he called, "And bring me, please, a piece of bread."</li> <li><sup>12</sup> "As surely as the LORD your God lives," she replied, "I don't have any bread—only a handful of flour in a jar and a little olive oil in a jug. I am gathering a few sticks to take home and make a meal for myself and my son, that</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>we may eat it—and die."</li> <li><sup>13</sup> Elijah said to her, "Don't be afraid. Go home and do as you have said. But first make a small loaf of bread for me from what you have and bring it to me, and then make something for yourself and your son. <sup>14</sup> For this is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the LORD sends rain on the land.'"</li> <li><sup>15</sup> She went away and did as Elijah had told her. So there was food every day for Elijah and for the woman and her family. <sup>16</sup> For the jar of flour was not used up and the jug of oil did not run dry, in keeping with the word of the LORD spoken by Elijah. (<i>continued</i>)</li> </ul>			

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1 Kings 17:7-24 - continued			
<sup>17</sup> Some time later the son of the woman who owned the house became ill. He grew worse and worse, and finally stopped breathing. <sup>18</sup> She said to Elijah, "What do you have against me, man of God? Did you come to remind me of my sin and kill my son?"			
<sup>19</sup> "Give me your son," Elijah replied. He took him from her arms, carried him to the upper room where he was staying, and laid him on his bed. <sup>20</sup> Then he cried out to the LORD, "LORD my God, have you brought tragedy even on this widow I am staying with, by causing her son to die?" <sup>21</sup> Then he stretched himself out on the boy three times and cried out to the LORD, "LORD my God, let this boy's life return to him!"			
<sup>22</sup> The LORD heard Elijah's cry, and the boy's life returned to him, and he lived. <sup>23</sup> Elijah picked up the child and carried him down from the room into the house. He gave him to his mother and said, "Look, your son is alive!"			
<sup>24</sup> Then the woman said to Elijah, "Now I know that you are a man of God and that the word of the LORD from your mouth is the truth."			
1 Kings 21:1-24			
Naboth's Vineyard			
<b>21</b> Some time later there was an incident involving a vineyard belonging to Naboth the Jezreelite. The vineyard was in Jezreel, close to the palace of Ahab king of Samaria. <sup>2</sup> Ahab said to Naboth, "Let me have your vineyard to use for a vegetable garden, since it is close to my palace. In exchange I will give you a better vineyard or, if you prefer, I will pay you whatever it is worth." ( <i>continued</i> )			

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1 Kings 21:1-24 - continued			
<sup>3</sup> But Naboth replied, "The LORD forbid that I should give you the inheritance of my ancestors."			
<sup>4</sup> So Ahab went home, sullen and angry because Naboth the Jezreelite had said, "I will not give you the inheritance of my ancestors." He lay on his bed sulking and refused to eat.			
<sup>5</sup> His wife Jezebel came in and asked him, "Why are you so sullen? Why won't you eat?"			
<sup>6</sup> He answered her, "Because I said to Naboth the Jezreelite, 'Sell me your vineyard; or if you prefer, I will give you another vineyard in its place.' But he said, 'I will not give you my vineyard.'"			
<sup>7</sup> Jezebel his wife said, "Is this how you act as king over Israel? Get up and eat! Cheer up. I'll get you the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite."			
<sup>8</sup> So she wrote letters in Ahab's name, placed his seal on them, and sent them to the elders and nobles who lived in Naboth's city with him. <sup>9</sup> In those letters she wrote:			
"Proclaim a day of fasting and seat Naboth in a prominent place among the people. <sup>10</sup> But seat two scoundrels opposite him and have them bring charges that he has cursed both God and the king. Then take him out and stone him to death."			
<sup>11</sup> So the elders and nobles who lived in Naboth's city did as Jezebel directed in the letters she had written to them. <sup>12</sup> They proclaimed a fast and seated Naboth in a prominent place among the people. ( <i>continued</i> )

1 Kings 21:1-24 – <i>continued</i>			
<sup>13</sup> Then two scoundrels came and sat opposite him and brought charges against Naboth before the people, saying, "Naboth has cursed both God and the king." So they took him outside the city and stoned him to death. <sup>14</sup> Then they sent word to Jezebel: "Naboth has been stoned to death."			
<sup>15</sup> As soon as Jezebel heard that Naboth had been stoned to death, she said to Ahab, "Get up and take possession of the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite that he refused to sell you. He is no longer alive, but dead." <sup>16</sup> When Ahab heard that Naboth was dead, he got up and went down to take possession of Naboth's vineyard.			
<sup>17</sup> Then the word of the LORD came to Elijah the Tishbite: <sup>18</sup> "Go down to meet Ahab king of Israel, who rules in Samaria. He is now in Naboth's vineyard, where he has gone to take possession of it. <sup>19</sup> Say to him, 'This is what the LORD says: Have you not murdered a man and seized his property?' Then say to him, 'This is what the LORD says: In the place where dogs licked up Naboth's blood, dogs will lick up your blood—yes, yours!'"			
<ul> <li><sup>20</sup> Ahab said to Elijah, "So you have found me, my enemy!"</li> <li>"I have found you," he answered, "because you have sold yourself to do evil in the eyes of the LORD. <sup>21</sup> He says, 'I am going to bring disaster on you. I will wipe out your descendants and cut off from Ahab every last male in Israel—slave or free.<sup>[a]</sup> (<i>continued</i>)</li> </ul>

<sup>22</sup> I will make your house like that of Jeroboam son of Nebat and that of Baasha son of Ahijah, because you have aroused my anger and have caused Israel to sin.'			
<sup>23</sup> "And also concerning Jezebel the LORD says: 'Dogs will devour Jezebel by the wall of <sup>[b]</sup> Jezreel.'			
<sup>24</sup> "Dogs will eat those belonging to Ahab who die in the city, and the birds will feed on those who die in the country."			
2 Kings 9:30-37			
Jezebel Killed			
<sup>30</sup> Then Jehu went to Jezreel. When Jezebel heard about it, she put on eye makeup, arranged her hair and looked out of a window. <sup>31</sup> As Jehu entered the gate, she asked, "Have you come in peace, you Zimri, you murderer of your master?" <sup>[G]</sup>			
<sup>32</sup> He looked up at the window and called out, "Who is on my side? Who?" Two or three eunuchs looked down at him. <sup>33</sup> "Throw her down!" Jehu said. So they threw her down, and some of her blood spattered the wall and the horses as they trampled her underfoot.			
<sup>34</sup> Jehu went in and ate and drank. "Take care of that cursed woman," he said, "and bury her, for she was a king's daughter." ( <i>continued</i> )

2 Kings 9:30-37 – continued <sup>35</sup> But when they went out to bury her, they found nothing except her skull, her feet and her hands. <sup>36</sup> They went back and told Jehu, who said, "This is the word of the LORD that he spoke through his servant Elijah the Tishbite: On the plot of ground at Jezreel dogs will devour Jezebel's flesh. <sup>[d] 37</sup> Jezebel's body will be like dung on the ground in the plot at Jezreel, so that no one will be able to say, 'This is Jezebel.''
